The Team

Reporting to a Deputy County Executive, the Director will oversee a three-person team including an Admin Analyst III (vacant) supporting Economic Vitality; and two Principal Admin Analysts focused on West Marin (vacant) and Marin City (filled). The Director will help recruit the two vacant positions.

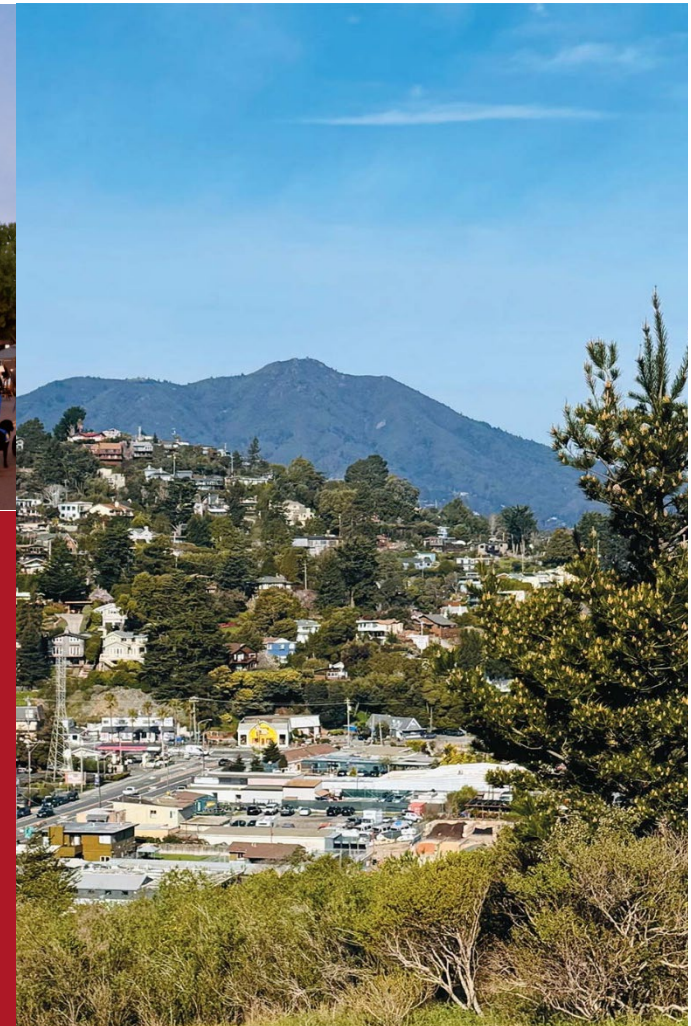

Few executive opportunities provide the chance to build a County function from the ground up. The successful candidate will help establish the County's long-term Economic Vitality and Municipal Services function by recruiting key staff, advising the Board on priorities and serving as a key liaison to cities, towns and community partners.

This unique position combines countywide strategy with community-based leadership. Through oversight of Municipal Services in West Marin and Marin City, the Director will ensure that countywide economic vitality initiatives are informed by local priorities and community partners.

West Marin

West Marin's coastal communities are central to Marin's identity. The Director will support the West Marin Principal Analyst advance place-based initiatives that support agriculture, workforce housing, public infrastructure and local businesses.

Marin City

Marin City is a diverse and historically significant unincorporated community. The Director will support the Marin City Municipal Services Manager advance key priorities like partnerships with the Community Services District, workforce training, improvements to public infrastructure and community placemaking including events and art.
